Building Competence in Evidencebased Teaching and Evaluation of Learning

In June of this year, I had the privilege of attending the NLN Immersion in Evidence-Based Nursing Education Conference. I received a grant from Jefferson Community and Technical College through the David Jones Endowment for Professional Development.

The conference was divided into three intensive study groups. The group I chose to participate in was for new nursing educators. The two presenters were, Linda Caputi, EdD, RN, CNE and Judy Herrman, PhD, RN, ANEF. Dr. Caputi was named Educator of the Year for 2004 by the National Organization of Associate Degree Nursing. She is Professor Emeritus at College of DuPage in Glen Ellyn, Illinois with over 25 years of teaching experience. She currently teaches online Master in Nursino Education courses. Dr. Caputi is a consultant to undergraduate nursing programs in the areas of curriculum, student success, NCLEX success and effective teaching strategies in the classroom, the nursing laboratory and clinical. She is author of *Teaching* Nursing: The Art and Science.

Dr. Herrman has been a nurse educator for almost 2D years. Dr. Herrman has always been interested in incorporating creative teaching strategies in nursing education and staff development. Her quest to supplement traditional teaching methods with innovative methods has to the publication of several articles and the book, *Creative Teaching Strategies for the Nurse Educator*.


